Sussex County 4-H Community:

Provided here is the 2024 4-H Exhibit Catalog for entering the upcoming New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show, August 2-10.

We will not be printing full copies. If you require a full copy of the 2024 4-H Fair Exhibit Catalog, please contact the Sussex County 4-H Office to request a hard copy.

Sussex 4-H leaders, parents and members please review the 4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code. You are expected to adhere to this behavior code at all times. Failure to do so may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds and forfeit of all ribbons and premiums.

No entry form will be accepted without both the 4-H member's and the parent/guardian's signature.

All club booths and exhibits inside the Shotwell Building must be completed by 9 p.m. on the Wednesday before the fair officially opens. All individual exhibits must be dropped off the Sunday before the fair. The fair opens officially **at 5 pm** on Friday and people will begin to visit the indoor exhibits. All exhibit items must remain on display until 10:00 pm on the last Saturday of the fair.

4-H leaders should devote a 4-H club meeting to work with their members on entering items in the fair. New members will not know how to do this unless you share this information. At minimum, they should read over the Entry Rules, and the rules for any departments their club's members may plan to exhibit. Families new to 4-H should review, *Prepare for the Fair*.

Your cooperation and assistance in helping 4-H'ers complete the 4-H Member entry forms properly will be greatly appreciated.

Every 4-H member must submit an individual entry form indicating their participation in the fair to be eligible for fair passes.

Please return or mail your members' 4-H Member entry forms to:

- The 4-H/RCE Office at 130 Morris Turnpike, Newton, NJ 07860 by July 1st.
- (The 4-H office is located in Frankford Township across from the Office of Emergency Planning on CR 655.)
- If July 1st falls on a Saturday or Sunday, the 4-H Member entry forms are due in the 4-H Office the Friday before*.
- No exceptions will be made for entries that are received after this date.
- If forms are incomplete they will not be processed. All forms must be processed by the 4-H Office before they are sent to the Ag. Division Office at the fairgrounds (Tammy Hayes).

Any forms processed after July 1st will be marked as late and the participant will be ineligible for passes and premiums.

Please plan to submit all 4-H member entry forms and other materials for your project area by the July 1st deadline.

4-H Member entry forms are available at the 4-H Office or online at www.sussex4h.org (under Forms).

If you would like to pick up hard copies from the 4-H Office, please contact the office in advance to make arrangements.

4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code Agreement

According to policy set forth by the Sussex County 4-H Program Advisory Council in concurrence with Rutgers Cooperative Extension and the Department of 4-H Youth Development and further endorsed by the Executive Committee of the NJ State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show, the following statement and 4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code shall apply to all 4-H members, their parents, families, legal guardians, and volunteer 4-H leaders.

The Sussex County 4-H Youth Development Program will adhere to the 4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code as outlined below and additionally endorses all behavior policies as noted in the official International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) code of behavior for exhibitors. The IAFE code will be prominently posted throughout the exhibit areas used by Sussex County 4-H (Shotwell Building, Livestock Show Arena and animal barns). **No 4-H fair project entry form will be accepted unless both the 4-H member and parent/guardian sign this agreement.**

Note: Violations of any aspect of the 4-H or IAFE Code Of Conduct will be immediately reported to the NJSF®/SCFHS, Agricultural Area Coordinator. Immediate corrective action will be taken with further disciplinary action to follow upon detailed investigation of the infraction or incident.

4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code (applies to 4-H Volunteers, Members, and Families)

- The health, safety, and welfare of others must be respected at all times.
- Appropriate language and behavior are expected at all times. Profanity, foul or abusive language, inflammatory statements, derogatory comments or physical altercations toward any group or individual are not permitted.
- Participants are expected to participate in all scheduled club activities at the NJSF®/SCF&HS.
- 4-H members are required to wear exhibitor name tags/numbers for proper identification while on the grounds or participating in a 4-H event.
- Participants are responsible for following the instructions of all 4-H staff and event 4-H volunteer leaders.
- All behavior or language of a sexual nature at 4-H events is inappropriate and unacceptable. Dignified and respectable behavior is expected at all times from youth and adults.
- Curfew hours must be strictly followed.
- Behavior during free time is subject to the supervision of 4-H staff and 4-H leaders.
- Previously set Dress Code standards for the event must be met by all participants (i.e., no sexually suggestive, culturally insensitive, tobacco or alcohol industry sponsored shirts, inappropriately cut shirts, shorts, pants or skirts, etc.)
- Possession, distribution or use of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs is prohibited. Prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications may be dispensed by adult chaperones only with written authorization provided by the parent/guardian on the 4-H Event Permission Form filed for the event.
- For the well being of self and others, smoking and the use of other tobacco products is prohibited in all animal barns. (*As of 2022, the Sussex County Fairgrounds is a smoke-free zone.*)
- Care and respect for property, personal and institutional, is expected at all times. Theft or possession of missing property is prohibited.
- Unauthorized possession, distribution or use of weapons, ammunition or fireworks is prohibited.
- Honesty is expected at all times from 4-H members. Dishonesty, cheating, plagiarism and forgery are inappropriate actions.

You will be required to sign 4-H registration forms for NJSF®/SCFHS indicating that you have read the 4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code outlined above and discussed it with your son/daughter and understand and agree to the conditions set forth.

4-H Exhibit Catalog Entry Rules

1. The 4-H Exhibit Committee will not be liable, in any way, for loss due to fire, water, theft, an act of God/Nature, or any cause whatsoever, and the exhibitors shall hold the Fair Committee blameless for any loss and upon this condition only are the entries accepted. However every precaution will be taken to protect the exhibits.
2. ALL exhibits, including Club Booths and Cloverbud Booths, must remain on view until 10:00 p.m. on the last Saturday. All exhibits must be removed on Sunday following the last day of the fair. Livestock exhibitors should check with their department chairperson to find out the time of departure for their species. Exhibitors are responsible for removal of the exhibits and for the pick up of their premiums. Any exhibitor removing an exhibit or any part of an exhibit without permission from the department chairperson before 10:00 pm on Saturday will forfeit all ribbons and premiums.
3. Only officially enrolled and active 4-H club members in Sussex County are eligible to exhibit. Members must be enrolled in the 4-H Online enrollment program to be eligible.
4. A 4-H youth member (regular/standard) must be enrolled in a 4-H club by January 1st of the current year to be eligible to exhibit. All exhibits must be the result of the current 4-H year's project work.
5. Each exhibit item must be listed on a 4-H Member Entry Form. If 4-H Member entry forms are not filled out completely with name of exhibitor, complete mailing address, grade level completed in school, and phone number, it will be assumed that the exhibitor is a Cloverbud member. The local 4-H club leader as indicated by his/her signature must then approve this entry form. All 4-H member entry forms must be returned to the 4-H Office, 130 Morris Turnpike, Newton, NJ 07860 by July 1st. **If the 1st falls on a Saturday or a Sunday, then the form is due the Friday before.** Any entry received after this date will forfeit all cash awards.
6. 4-H Member entry forms must be filled out completely and neatly using Department Numbers, Section Numbers, Class Numbers, Name of Article, Name of Exhibitor, & Grade Level Completed in School by Exhibitor During Current Year. Pre-printed exhibit tags will be available when items are received at the fairgrounds.
7. Most departments indicate only one entry per class is allowed. Some departments indicate otherwise. Be sure to read the department rules for each department in which you intend to exhibit items. Entries not meeting department and class requirements will be disqualified by department chairperson, thus forfeiting all ribbons.
8. All Shotwell Building exhibit items shall be prejudged before the fair, except as noted in *When Shotwell Building Exhibits Have To Be On The Fairgrounds*.
9. Project Record Books for all Departments **must** be submitted to the local 4-H club leader for evaluation and review along with the 4-H Member Entry Form. A separate record book is required for each club in which a 4-H member is registered. If any club's work involves more than one project area, (*for example: Dairy Goats and Sheep*), a record book for each project area must be completed for that particular club.
Leaders for each project area must initial next to the project(s) on the entry form after review of the appropriate record book(s) has been completed. All 4-H leaders are asked to cooperate by collecting the 4-H member entry form(s) and any record book(s) for each member.

A 4-H leader or an adult designated by the club leader must submit all the 4-H member entry forms **and record books from their entire club** to the 4-H Office located at 130 Morris Turnpike, Newton, NJ, 07860, off of CR 655 across from the Office of Emergency Management by July 1st (*or Friday before if July 1st falls on a weekend*).

4-H Exhibit Catalog Entry Rules (continued)

10. Final Project Record Evaluation: all project record books, are to be given final examination by 4-H club leaders during the month of September. Only project achievements deserving of county medal recognition, as determined by the club leader, should be sent to the 4-H Office. Leaders will be sent complete instructions for final project evaluation in September.
11. All exhibits by 4-H youth members (regular/standard) will be judged on a modified Danish System. Scores will be blue—*Excellent*, red—*Very Good*, or yellow—*Good*. Rosettes will be awarded for the best exhibit judged *Excellent* in each department with at least three entries. *Best of Class* rosettes may be awarded at the discretion of the judges. Cash premiums will be awarded to all exhibits except those in Ribbon Only Classes, and Cloverbud members or members enrolled in a Cloverbud club.

When Shotwell Building Exhibits Have To Be On Fairgrounds

- ∞ Entries in the following Departments; *Forestry & Conservation*, *Child Care*, *Home Furnishings*, *Arts & Crafts*, *Art*, *Ceramics*, *Needlecraft*, *Photography*, *Construction*, *Woodcraft Engineering*, *Feline Studies-Furnishing and Accessories* and *Hobbies & Collections* must be received **between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm on the Sunday before the fair opens.**
- ∞ *Club booth* and *Cloverbud Booth* displays may be set up **between 3:00 and 9:00 pm on the Tuesday and/or Wednesday before the fair opens.**
- ∞ *Clothing Construction* and *Shooting Sports* displays may be set up **between 3:00 and 9:00 pm on the Tuesday and/or Wednesday before the fair.** The Department Chairs will provide information regarding exact times for check-in.
- ∞ Entries in *Vegetables; Herbs; and Flowers* must be received and on display **between 10:00 and 12:00 Noon on Friday morning of the fair.**
- ∞ Entries in *Foods & Nutrition* and *Food Preservation* must be brought to the grounds **between 9:30 am and 12:00 Noon on Wednesday of fair week.**

Rules For Usage Of The Shotwell Building

- ∞ During the Fair, usage of the Shotwell 4-H Exhibit Hall for any purpose (including storage of materials) must be approved by the 4-H Office.
- ∞ The scheduling of all *4-H Learning Center* programs during the fair must be arranged by the 4-H Exhibits Committee co-chairs.
- ∞ Only animals that are part of a *Learning Center* program may be in the building.
- ∞ Animals that are part of a *Learning Center* program are allowed in the building no more than 15 minutes before and/or after such a program. Such animals are restricted to the stage area at all times.

3. A club member may enter only one (1) exhibit per class, for a total of seven (7) items in this department.
4. **All members must submit a form specifying each item by section code and class number to their 4-H leader. The leader will submit the 4-H member entry forms and record books for the entire club to the 4-H Office by July 1st.**
5. Exhibitors must provide their own containers and label with name and club on tape fastened to bottom of container. (No paper cups or other lightweight containers.)
6. Failure to exhibit exact number of stems called for in a particular class will cause the exhibit to be disqualified.
7. Cut flowers will be judged on quality and uniformity, flower arrangement and selection of container.

Project Record Book Requirements:

Record books **must** be submitted to the local 4-H Club leader for evaluation and review along with the 4-H Member Entry Form by the specified deadline for your project area.

Record books for all 4-H livestock department entries must be completed as specified by the rules for each department and submitted with the 4-H Member Entry Form. Entries received without record books will not receive cash premiums. The 4-H leader should not sign the 4-H Member Entry Form unless current project records are submitted. All 4-H leaders are asked to cooperate by collecting the 4-H Member Entry Form and any necessary record books for each member. The 4-H leader, or an adult designated by the club leader, must submit all the 4-H Member Entry Forms and record books from their club to the 4-H office **no later than July 1st** no matter what day it happens to fall on. If the 1st falls on a Saturday or Sunday the entry forms and record books are due the Friday before. The 4-H office is located at 130 Morris Turnpike, Newton, NJ (Frankford Twp.), across from the Sheriff's Department Office of Emergency Management.

If space is available all 4-H animals must remain until the end of the Fair or forfeit the premiums paid by the New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm And Horse Show.

All exhibitors must abide by the rules of the Agricultural Division of the NJSF/SCF&HS, in addition to Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor and General Health Information section of the New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm and Horse Show website, <http://www.njstatefair.org/>

Water at the Fairgrounds may contain chlorine to combat harmful bacteria.

Updated Revisions to Animal Health Requirements (May 2, 2022)

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease

In regards to Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD), due to its infectious and fatal nature all rabbits and cavies entering the fairgrounds (for show and auction) must be required to have either an Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI). CVI is required for all out of state animals.

All animals entering the fairgrounds must have an Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or CVI and meet the requirements set by the veterinarians working with the Agricultural Division of the Sussex County Farm and Horse Show.

Avian Influenza

Due to the recent outbreaks of Avian Influenza, any poultry coming from out of state or planning to be sold must have a negative Avian Influenza test within 72 hours of entering the fairground.

Rabies Vaccination

Vaccines required for any and all show animals that have an approved rabies vaccine for that species (cattle, sheep, and equids). It is also recommended for show animals as an extra label vaccine (goats, alpacas, and swine). This is due to the-zoonotic (transmissible to humans) and fatal nature of rabies.

The above health requirements were adopted by the Agricultural Division, NJSF/SCFHS on May 2, 2022 as recommended by Dr. Monique Obsharski, DVM

Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI) Testing

All cattle, alpacas, and llamas must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). This test must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI). The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

It is recommended that all cattle, alpacas, and llamas be vaccinated for Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex (shipping fever). Owner(s) should discuss with their veterinarian the advantages of having their animals vaccinated for the Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex.

Cattle Testing:

Currently acceptable BVD-PI tests for cattle less than 61 days old:

- Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
- Whole blood virus isolation
- Whole blood PCR

Currently acceptable BVD-PI tests for cattle 61 days of age and older:

- Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
- Serum or milk Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)
- Whole blood virus isolation
- Whole blood, serum or plasma PCR

Note: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory of Cornell University can conduct PCR testing on pools of up to 10 cattle.

Llama, Alpaca Testing:

- Currently acceptable BVD tests:
- PCR
- Whole blood virus isolation

Note: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory of Cornell University can pool llama, etc. samples for PCR testing as follows: Animals less than 61 days of age can be tested in pools of 2 animals, whole blood only. Animals 61 days of age and older can be tested in pools of 5 animals using whole blood, serum or plasma.

Kevin Mitchell reviewed the above information regarding BVD-PI with Dr. Paul Tallamy February 28, 2012.

RULES:

All birds must go through Vet Check to enter the fairgrounds. *Any bird showing signs of contagious disease & or parasites, will be removed from the show hall at the order of the Fair Veterinarian.*

Entrants must be 4-H member of an active 4-H poultry club and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show. 4-H club must be active as of February 1st; after this date club members will have limited participation. 4-H Member Entry forms must be submitted to department chairperson by June 18th.

1. Animal must be a bonafide 4-H project by May 1st of current year and be recorded in a poultry project book.
2. Project books must be up to date for the whole year to enter into the fair and receive fair tickets. *Project books must be turned in to department chairperson by June 18th.*
3. Showmanship must be completed in order to receive premiums
4. **Awards:** all entries will be awarded *Excellent, Very Good, or Good*
5. All members, leaders, and parents will follow 4-H Exhibitor Behavior Code. Anyone not abiding by the behavior code will be removed from the fairgrounds and must turn in their passes to fair security.
6. Food and water will be available at the show hall. It is the responsibility of the owner to supply approved type containers, 2 per cage, one for water and one for feed; each cage must have 2 containers. Birds must be checked on a daily basis and cleaned as necessary. Acceptable types of containers: are 1 qt. and 1 pt. plastic cage cups. These may be purchased from the club. No paper cups, tin cans or deep, narrow containers will be allowed. All feed/water containers must be secured to cage sides or front corners to prevent tipping over. Even for small bantams, hook-on feeders should be on at least the second bar from the bottom to prevent soiling. We are pleased to *freshen* feed and water in the morning, since most exhibitors cannot be present at that time. *However*, each bird exhibited must be checked, either by the exhibitor or his representative daily and cleaning and feeding done as necessary. Supplies are available in the show hall. *Waterfowl especially* require daily feeding and cleaning. The water container should not be open enough to encourage bathing, as the bedding becomes too wet for good sanitation
7. The SCPFA will guard against accident, loss or damage, **but** will not be liable should any occur.
8. **New Jersey State Law Requirements:** New Jersey Law requires pullorum testing in order to show or sell birds. **Be prepared to have your birds checked for pullorum certificates. Waterfowl are exempt.** All county fairs are under the auspices of New Jersey Department of Agriculture. State inspectors will be present on the fairgrounds.
9. All 4-H Members who intend to exhibit poultry projects must have given a county level 4-H Public Presentation and a approved community service project.
10. Cloverbuds are not eligible for premiums. Cloverbud projects will be evaluated but not judged.
11. Ag Representative Selection: Qualifications include: Member in good standing and in the club at least 1 4-H year, in high school or 13th year, highest average of showmanship score and public presentation score (both scored out of 100 pts).

4-H MARKET ANIMAL PROJECT

Lamb, Beef, Hog, Goat

- 4-H members must comply with General Health Fair Exhibitor Rules of the New Jersey State Fair®/ Sussex County Farm & Horse Show, as posted on their website, the 4-H Exhibitor Catalog Department Rules, as well as the rules described herein. Only 4-H Youth members (grade 4 and above) may participate in the market animal projects. Failure to comply with these requirements will disqualify the member from participating in the following year's Market Animal Sale.
- Project animals are required to be on the member's property by a specific date: January 1st for market beef projects, May 1st for market lambs and goats born on the member's farm, (or age of weaning, but no more than 12 weeks of age if purchased), May 1st for market hogs, and July 1st for market rabbits. If this requirement has not been met, a Land/Lease/Board Contract between the 4-H member and the landowner/farmer must be completed and on file with the 4-H office by February 1st for market beef and by Feb 1st for market lambs and goats (or for pregnant ewes/does and their unborn offspring), May 1st for market hogs and July 1st for market rabbits. Authorized adult club leaders must determine whether a project animal can be replaced due to sickness or injury. Should the situation arise, the club's organizational leader must notify the MAS Committee immediately. After July 1st, a 4-H member can only replace a designated market lamb, hog, goat, beef, or rabbit pen (3 rabbits), with another animal that is already in their project record book and has been raised at their farm.

Note: *The Land/Lease/Board Contract for sheep and goats covers the pregnant ewe/doe and any of its unborn offspring which may be used for a market project animal.*

3. Birth dates of each market project are as follows:

- Market lambs must be born January 1st or later of the current year.
- Market goats must be born January 1st or later of the current year.
- Market hogs must be born February 1st or later of the current year.
- Market beef must be born after November 1st of the previous year and not be more than 21 months old or showing any permanent incisor teeth at the time of the show.

4. Market Project Finished Weight Requirements:

- Market lambs must be a minimum of 75 lbs. and 150 lbs. maximum pay weight.
- Market goats must be between 50 lbs. and 120 lbs. maximum pay weight.
- Market hogs must be between 200 lbs. and 275 lbs. maximum pay weight.
- Market beef must be between 900 lbs. and 1550 lbs. maximum pay weight.

4-H Market animal Sale Project (Continued)

5. A NJ animal health certificate is required for every animal and signed by a veterinarian. No animal will be unloaded at the fairgrounds before a designated fair official completes a health evaluation on the animal. The NJ Animal health certificate must include proof of rabies vaccine/BVD test for beef, pseudo rabies/Brucellosis for hogs by a licensed veterinarian (if required by the Ag Division of the NJSF/SCF&HS). Rabies vaccinations are recommended for all species. All animals must complete a pink drug form. Out-of-state animals are required to have an official CVI from their state.
6. A 4-H member may raise more than one market project species and may also raise more than one animal (lamb, goat, beef, hog, rabbit pen) in each species. The member may enter up to two animals per species for judging. If a member does raise more than one species, he or she may only sell one of each species in the Market Animal Sale, as long as they fulfill all requirements for their MAS project animals and are members in good standing. The only exception to this rule is when the 4-H member's projects have been awarded both Grand and Reserve Champion in a single species. This necessitates both the Grand and Reserve Champions must be sold in the MAS.
7. No *horned* animals will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit.
8. All market animals must be weighed in between 8:00 and 10:00 AM on the first Monday of the fair at times to be announced by the division chairpersons. All animals must be prepared to be weighed by 8:00 AM. Failure to do so will forfeit the right to show. Animals that fail to meet the minimum weight requirement will be disqualified from the Sale.
9. The following items must be completed and submitted by the designated deadline:
 - a. 4-H members must give a county level public presentation for the current project year, in order to qualify to sell their market animal in the sale.
 - b. If the market project animal is not on the 4-H member's property, a Sussex 4-H Land/Lease/Board Contract must be submitted to the 4-H Office by the deadlines as specified in Rule 2 above.
 - c. Yellow market registration forms must be completed and submitted to the club leader and MAS Secretary by the following dates (see table). Members must attach two photos for each animal- 1 full body shot, and 1 head shot with ear tag/tattoo clearly visible. If ear tag is lost or has fallen out, the member must contact the leader and provide the new tag number and new photos. The leader must immediately notify the Chair of the MAS Committee and submit new tag number and photos. *Animal cannot be re-tagged in the same hole in the ear. It must be re-tagged in opposite ear.*

- d. A 4-H project record book completed through May must be submitted to club leader at the June species club meeting to be reviewed and signed by the club leader.
- e. A NJSF/SCFHS entry form must be completed and handed in to species club leader at the June species club meeting.
- f. An MAS (green) booster form must be completed and handed in to species club leader at their June club meeting. All booster forms and accompanying funds must be submitted to the MAS Treasurer by July 1st. Failure to comply with any of the above requirements will forfeit a member's eligibility to participate in the MAS.

4-H Market animal Sale Project (Continued)

10. Only animals awarded a blue ribbon (Excellent) at their respective show may be sold, and those may be sold at the option of the exhibitor, except for the Grand and Reserve Champion animals of each species. These must be offered for sale. If a 4-H member chooses to withdraw his or her animal from the sale, they must inform their 4-H club leader and the Chair of the MAS Committee as soon as possible, and prior to the beginning of the sale.
11. When an animal is sold in the 4-H Market Animal Sale, the sale is final. 4-H members or their parents, relatives or friends may not interfere with the transfer of the animal to the buyer or hauler. A 4-H member may not keep his or her animal and receive payment for the sale of the animal.
12. Dress for market sale (photo, social and sale) will be clean blue jeans and MAS T-shirt. No ripped jeans, shorts, baseball hats or sandals are permitted.
13. On the day of the Sale all members must have their photo taken with their animal, based on the schedule arranged with the photographer. Leaders will notify their club members of their scheduled photo time.
All members must meet in the Ag Livestock Arena show ring at 5:00 pm for group photo. Bio cards and drug forms will be collected at 10:00 AM on the day of the Sale.
14. Any 4-H member who is not available to present his or her animal for sale at the appropriate time will forfeit the privilege of selling the animal. Extraordinary circumstances will be considered at the discretion of the 4-H club's leader, who will then need to obtain approval from the MAS executive board for this to be allowed.
15. 4-H members are responsible for picking up their meat at the processing facility, for delivery to their buyer or charity. 4-H members will be notified via email of meat pick up date and time, along with the buyer's name(s) and contact information, to arrange for delivery of the meat. **If the 4-H member is not able to pick up the meat, s/he must:**
 - Make arrangements in advance for someone else to pick up and deliver their meat and;
 - Contact buyer(s) and/or charities prior to the day of delivery.
16. All meat must be delivered to the buyer or the buyer selected charity on day of pick up, or agreed upon date by the buyer. Failure to meet these responsibilities will result in a 10% penalty, deducted from his or her proceeds.
17. The 4-H member will receive no less than 90% of the sale price. The percentage the 4-H member receives for the sale of their market animal will be determined by the MAS committee.
18. The Buyer Social is offered to provide a meal and allow socialization for the buyers in gratitude, and as an incentive to purchase an animal. Each club is responsible for purchasing, cooking and carving their club's meat contribution to the social meal. 4-H members who are selling animals may be present (in appropriate dress) for a short time, beginning at 5:30 to mingle with the buyers. All 4-H members shall be present at the:
 - BBQ Pavilion to help move chairs to the Ag Arena (~6:30)
 - Ag Arena for the opening ceremony at the beginning of the sale (~7:00)
 - Ag Arena at the close of the sale to help move chairs back to the BBQ Pavilion.
19. Resale of any market animals will be scheduled at the end of the sale. Only one animal of each species will be auctioned at the end of the sale. Funds generated by this resale are donated to Sussex County 4-H affiliated organizations such as the 4-H Foundation, or 4-H MAS Scholarship Fund.
20. Proceeds from the Market Animal Sale will be distributed in-person to 4-H members after all buyers have paid for their purchases on a scheduled date, time, and location (TBD).
21. A parent or guardian of any 4-H members intending to participate in the MAS must attend a mandatory parent meeting in the fall and the month of April. There will be no exceptions, unless otherwise excused by the MAS executive board. If a parent or guardian does not attend this meeting, the 4-H member will not be permitted to participate in the MAS.

4-H Market animal Sale Project (Continued)

22. Successful participation in MAS requires support from the member's parent(s)/guardian. Parents of 4-H members will be required to donate food (or make a cash contribution in lieu) to the MAS Social. Additionally, 4-H parents will be asked to help with set up and cleanup of the social. Parents must sign up for their volunteer responsibilities at the mandatory parent meeting in April. Buyer packets will be emailed to all MAS members after the April parent meeting. Only buyers pre-registered by July 15th will be able to attend the social due to catering. Unless there are openings on the day of the social, but must be approved by the committee.
23. All 4-H members participating in the MAS show and sale are required to send a photo and thank you to their buyer(s). The MAS committee will provide photo files and buyers info. to the leader of each club. The leader will forward them to their MAS members. It is the responsibility of the member to make an 8"x10" photo from the files. They must deliver that photo in a picture frame along with a thank you note/card to each of their buyer(s) in a timely manner.

Also, all members that are chosen to deliver a buyers gift to a buyer must do so in a timely manner. They will make delivery arrangements with the buyer prior to gift pick up. The buyer's contact information and address will be provided in advance for this purpose.

If a member does not fulfill these obligations, they will be ineligible to participate in the MAS program the following year. Any member aging out of 4-H that doesn't fulfill their obligations will be subject to a penalty fee being deducted from their MAS sales check (Penalty to be determined by the MAS committee).
24. If a 4-H member violates any of the rules, the 4-H member may not show or sell their animal(s) in the 4-H MAS.
25. If a member or parent/guardian violates the 4-H Code of Conduct during the fair, the member may be disqualified from participation in that fair's MAS and may be barred from future participation in the MAS program. This decision will be made by the Market Animal Sale Committee.
26. The MAS reserves the right to make exceptions to any of the above rules under extenuating circumstances. 4-H club leaders of the sheep, beef, hog, goat and rabbit project clubs must report any such situations occurring with individual members which cause conflict in conforming to the above regulations to the 4-H Market Animal Show and Sale Planning Committee which will take appropriate action.

The following policy is to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H beef project shows at the NJSF/SCFHS®

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each 4-H member is responsible for obtaining an NJSF®/SCFHS 4-H Livestock Entry form as soon as they are available from the 4-H office or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader.
3. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H Office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
4. 4-H member entry forms that are turned in after July 1st will be identified as received late. 4-H animal projects that are entered late will forfeit all premiums, placings and the right to sell their animal at the Market Animal Sale.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. An Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is required for each 4-H beef project entered. A CVI is required for all out of state animals. The AHC/CVI must be shown to a fair veterinarian at Vet Check before entering the fairgrounds. An AHC/ CVI must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair.
2. In addition to the AHC/CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or fair veterinarian.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds. If a member's project animal is removed prior to the show, they may borrow an animal to show in their Showmanship class.
4. No horned animals will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit.
5. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of the The NJSF®/SCFHS website, <http://njstatefair.org/>.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. 4-H members must have completed the 4th grade and have met all Member in Good Standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums or sell a market animal in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
2. Due to age and the objectives of the NJ 4-H Cloverbud program, Cloverbud members are *not* eligible to receive premiums or to sell a market animal in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.

Cloverbud members who have completed grades 1-3 and are *Members in Good Standing* may participate in a showmanship class held before the 4-H Beef Show. Participants will *not* be placed, the class is intended to provide members experience showing their project animal. Cloverbud members will be recognized with participation awards.

4-H BEEF BREEDING & MARKET BEEF PROJECTS (Continued)

Please note that the purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to introduce Cloverbud members to a variety of 4-H projects, which are available to them upon reaching 4th grade.

1. All members must give a county level 4-H public presentation to be eligible for fair passes, premiums, 4-H Beef Show, and to sell an animal in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
If a member is unable to give a county level presentation, a leader must be notified in advance. The member's participation in the fair show, eligibility for ribbons and premiums will be at the discretion of the club's leaders. The leaders may opt to allow the member to make a presentation to the club if school or other commitments prevent the member from giving a county level presentation.
2. A person must have joined the project club before January 1st of current year in order to receive premiums and show in any market beef or breeding classes in the 4-H show. Members who miss the January 1st deadline, will be unable to sell a market animal at the 4-H Market Animal Sale.

SECTION BRE: 4-H Beef Breeding Project Requirements

1. The 4-H member must own or lease their 4-H beef breeding projects by May 1st. An exception to this would be animals falling under the loan agreement attested to by both parties of the agreement. A loan agreement must be on file at the 4-H office by May 1st.
2. If the member is showing a registered breeding project they must have the original registration papers to present to a 4-H leader/show superintendent at the time of the show. If the 4-H member is unable to present the original registration papers the project will be moved to a mixed breed (grade) class.
3. A 4-H leader or show superintendent may combine classes within the breed if there are less than five animals entered. Multiple breeds may be combined if there are not enough animals entered to form breed classes.
4. If a 4-H member shows a cow-calf pair, it is understood the member was responsible for the breeding decision. The dam must be owned by the 4-H member at the time of conception.
5. The first and second place heifers from each class will make up the championship heifer class.
6. The first and second place Cow-calf pair from each cow-calf class will make up the championship cow-calf class.

SECTION MAR: Market Steer Project Requirements

1. Market steers must have been born after January 1st of previous year, and not be more than 20 months old or showing any permanent incisor teeth at the time of the sale.
2. The member must have owned and obtained custody of their market steers by January 1st of the current year.
3. Market animals must be weighed in at the designated time on Monday of the fair. Failure to do so will forfeit the right to show.
4. Steer projects must weigh at least 900 lbs when weighed in at the fair in order to qualify for the Market Animal Sale. If the steer does not make weight, the member may still show their project in the Market Show.
5. Market steers will have a maximum finished weight of 1550 lbs. The buyer will only pay the bid price for up to 1550 lbs.
6. A market steer must be judged a blue ribbon (Excellent) to qualify for the sale.
7. First & Second place animals from each weight class will make up the championship class.
8. The Grand & Reserve Champion animals in the beef department market show must be sold. All other animals that receive a blue ribbon and qualify for the sale may be sold at the 4-H's discretion. Only one 4-H market steer project may be sold in the Market Animal Sale. A member may raise and show more than one project animal.

The following policy to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H dairy cattle project shows at the NJSF®/SCFHS

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each 4-H member is responsible for obtaining an NJSF®/SCFHS 4-H livestock entry form when they are available from the 4-H Office or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader and returned to the 4-H office by July 1st. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H Office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
3. Entry forms that are turned in after July 1st will be identified as received late 4-H animal projects that are entered late will forfeit all Danish placings and cash premiums awarded.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is required for each 4-H dairy project entered. The CVI must be shown to a club leader, fair livestock supervisor or veterinarian when the animal is unloaded at the fair. A CVI must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair.
2. In addition to the CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the Fair.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds.
4. Every animal must have proof of a shipping fever shot. This must be stated on the health form, which will be checked with the registration papers.
5. No horned animals will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit.
6. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of the The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, <http://njstatefair.org/>.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. All exhibitors must be active 4-H members in grades 4th thru 13th and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums.
2. 70% Attendance, Dairy Judging and Public Presentation requirements must be met to be eligible to show and/or receive premiums
3. Growing and/or production records must accompany all animal entries on each animal entered. Records must be completed as of May 1st and submitted with the 4-H member entry form.
4. Exhibitors shall be neatly dressed when exhibiting and wear clean white clothing. (No farm names on clothing) and wear sturdy, safe shoes. (No open toe shoes); no midriff shirts or short shorts.
5. A person must have joined the 4-H project club before January 1st of current year in order to show.
6. Cloverbud members (k-3rd grade) and are Members in Good Standing may participate in a showmanship class. Cloverbud members will not receive premiums, the class is intended to provide members experience showing their project animals. Cloverbud members will be recognized through participation awards.

SECTION D: 4-H Dairy Cattle Requirements

1. All animals must be born, leased or purchased before May 1st of current year. All lease agreements must be on file at the 4-H office by May 1st.
2. All exhibitors must have all animals not milking on the grounds between 12:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on Monday of fairweek. Milking animals may be brought to the fairgrounds and removed on the day they are to be shown.
3. It is required that all non-milking animals stay from Monday until Friday. It is recommended that non-milking animals stay until the closing Saturday if space is available. Entrants must state on the entry form the exact date their animals will leave the grounds.

4-H SHEEP & MARKET LAMB PROJECT

The following policy to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H sheep project shows at the NJSF®/SCFHS.

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each 4-H member is responsible for obtaining an NJSF®/SCFHS 4-H livestock entry form from the 4-H office, the Sussex 4-H web-site (www.sussex4h.org) or from the club leader. The Department Chairperson reserves the right to restrict the number of breed show entries based on the availability of barn space. Only animals entered on entry sheets will be admitted onto the fairgrounds. All entries listed on fair entry form must be included in 4-H member's project record book.
2. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader. Changes to entries must be reported to the club's leader after Veterinarian check-in when sheep projects arrive at the fair.
3. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H Office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
4. Project record books and 4-H member entry forms that are turned in after July 1st will be identified as received late. 4-H animal projects that are entered late will forfeit all premiums, placing and the right to sell their animal at the Market Animal Sale.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) Animal Health Certificate (AHC) is required for each 4-H sheep project. A CVI MUST be used for all out of state sheep. The AHC form may be used for in-state sheep and is available on the fair website. Both forms require veterinarian signature and inspection of the animals at their farm prior to the start of the fair, and within 30 days of the last day of the fair. The CVI or AHC must be shown at Vet Check before entering the fairgrounds. A CVI or AHC must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair. Animal ID numbers listed on the AHC/CVI paperwork must match the animal ID numbers on the 4-H member's entry form, and represent the animals present on the fairgrounds.
2. In addition to the AHC/CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the fair. During the 4-H project year if the 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could prevent an animal's participation in the show, the 4-H club leader should provide guidance and/or educational activities that will help the 4-H member correct these health conditions.
3. No lambs under twelve (12) weeks of age will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
4. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds.
5. No horned animals or aged rams (greater than 2 years old) will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit.
6. Proof of sheep rabies vaccine administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended. Vaccine must be given at least 21 days prior to the start of the fair.
7. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, <http://www.njstatefair.org/>.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. 4-H members must have completed the 4th grade and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums.
2. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums or sell a market animal in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
3. 4-H Cloverbud member may only participate in showmanship and costume classes if the project leadership offers such a class. Cloverbud members must have completed the Kindergarten – 3rd grade. No cash premiums are awarded, only participation ribbons and trophies. Cloverbud members are not permitted to bring their own sheep to the fair.
4. Please note that the purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to introduce Cloverbud members to a variety of 4-H projects, which are available to them upon reaching 4th grade. Participation in the 4-H Cloverbud program is not an opportunity to gain experience that can be credited towards a 4-Hers participation in the standard 4-H program upon reaching the 4th grade.
5. All 4-H members who intend to sell a market lamb in the 4-H Market Animal Sale must have given a county level 4-H public presentation.
6. A person must have joined the project club before January 1st of current year in order to show. Members who miss the January 1st deadline may show in the 4-H breeding and/or Market animal shows as a learning experience and receive participation ribbons only, but will not be awarded cash premiums and will be unable to sell a market animal at the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
7. All club members are required to raise and show at least one breeding sheep project in order to sell a market lamb.
8. The dress code for showing is clean jeans, a belt, a white collared shirt (no t-shirts); socks, and sturdy, safe shoes (no open toed shoes). Members must remain in show attire until conclusion of show and after a group photograph has been taken.

SECTION D: 4-H Breeding Sheep Project and/or Their Offspring Requirements

1. 4-H sheep breeding projects must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by February 1st. An exception to this is sheep, and/or their offspring, provided within a land/lease/borrow and purchase agreement attested to by both parties of the agreement. The agreement must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the January club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader before 2/1. Offspring from a breeding project may be shown so long as they are recorded in the member's record book and were born before 5/1.
2. If the land/lease/borrow and purchase agreement is not turned in to the Club Leader by the 2/1 deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any/all animals covered by the land/lease/borrow and purchase agreement. Any animals purchased or provided by agreement after 2/1, but before 5/1, will not be eligible to be shown in breed classes. They may be shown in the showmanship, fitting, and/or costume classes.
3. The 2/1 land/lease/borrow and purchase agreement will cover the ewe and any offspring from her, therefore any offspring from a lease/loaned ewe is eligible to be shown in the appropriate breed classes. Offspring covered by lease/loan and purchase agreements must be present or born on the member's property must be born before 5/1.
4. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a breeding project animal from within a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain a land/lease/borrow and purchase agreement by 2/1 for any potential mothers and/or offspring that they may be buying offspring from. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure that they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring of those leased mothers would be covered by the land/lease/borrow agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers aren't listed, a farm premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers must match farm premise ID# submitted on the LLB/purchase agreement.
5. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a breeding project animal from beyond a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain a lease/purchase agreement by 2/1 for any potential mothers that they may be buying offspring from. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure that they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring of those leased mothers would be covered by the lease/purchase agreement and must be

4-H SHEEP & MARKET LAMB PROJECT (continued)

on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers are not listed, a farm name/premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers must match farm premise ID#s submitted on the LLB/purchase agreement. Because it's too far to travel to that farmer/breeder to fulfill the requirements of a lease/loan agreement, they must obtain a land/lease/borrow agreement by 2/1 with a local farmer of their choice and meet all the requirements of said agreement. They do not need to bring the locally leased animal to the fair or show it, but must be listed in their project record book. It is strictly to gain hands-on experience working with a breeding project since it would be impossible to do this with the mother of the out-of-area offspring.

6. For those, who already own breeding projects, and are looking to add new breeding projects to their flock they will need to obtain a purchase agreement for any potential mothers that they may be buying offspring from. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure that they would be able to choose an animal to their liking or farm name and premise ID no.. Any offspring of those mothers would be covered by the purchase agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1.
7. All 4-H sheep projects must be on display before 5:00 pm on the first Friday of the fair.
8. All animals entered in the breed classes must provide a copy of the registration papers (or a copy of the application filed for registration, if registration is not available) for that specific breed by 6/30 to the Department chairperson.
9. Members have the option of showing breeding sheep at halter.
10. No yearling teeth can be evident in lambs. Yearlings (1-2 years old) may not have more than four permanent teeth.
11. No sheep may leave the display barn until the conclusion of the fair unless approved by the Agricultural Division President or Agricultural Area Coordinator and a Veterinarian.
12. There will be two separate classes, Fitting and Showmanship.
 - a. The members winning Junior and Senior Showmanship (1 each) will represent the Sheep Project in the Round Robin competition.
 - b. For the Showmanship class, the 4-H member will fit all breeding project animals. First year members may only receive assistance from other 4-H members and club leaders.
 - c. For the Fitting class, a first-year member may only receive assistance from another 4-H member or 4-H club leader. If the member receives any assistance in fitting their project animal, they must enter the Novice fitting class.
 - d. If a first-year member does all the fitting on their project animal (no assistance), they may enter one of the Regular fitting classes (Senior, Junior, Young Shepherd). Fitting in these classes must be done entirely by the 4-H member.
 - e. No 4-H'er may do the work of fully fitting a sheep for another 4-H'er. Parents are requested to follow this rule as well.
13. All members are responsible to know their classes and be ready when called into the show ring.
14. At the Judge's discretion, additional 4-H members are permitted in the show ring to assist and help set-up the animal, during market and breed show classes.
15. All sheep must be fed by 8:00 am and pens must be cleaned before 10:00 am daily. If a member is unable to feed and clean their animal's pens on schedule they should ask another member if they can do this for them. If a member violates this rule more than two (2) times they will be dismissed from the fairgrounds and forfeit any premiums.
16. Only first place animals which have a score of Blue/Excellent ribbon will compete for champion in the sheep breed show classes. Additionally all breed Champions (and Reserve Champions requested by judges) in each division will compete for overall Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Ram and Ewe.

SECTION E: Market Lamb Project Requirements

1. Market lambs must be born January 1st or later of the current year.
2. 4-H Market Lamb project must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 5/1. If animal is not born on member's property, it must be on the member's property at the age of weaning, but no more than 12 weeks of age. Head with ear tag and body shot photos of acquired animals must be provided to both the club leader and the Department Chairperson at the time of purchase and again on the date of delivery to your, or leased, property. Failure to provide pictures in a timely manner is grounds for disqualification from showing and selling of the animal. Club Leader or Department Chairperson reserves the right to inspect your animals at your farm at an agreed upon time.
3. Market projects must have a finished requirement of 75 lbs when weighed in at the fair and a maximum of 150 lbs. pay weight in order to qualify for the Market Animal Sale. If market lambs weigh less than 75 lbs. at official weigh-in, the 4-H member has the option of showing the market lamb(s) in their class. However, the entry/entries may not qualify for Champion or Reserve Champion titles, and may not be sold in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
4. To be eligible to show and sell a market lamb, the 4-H'er must raise and show at least one breeding animal in the 4-H sheep breed show. 4-H sheep breeding projects must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 2/1. An exception to this is sheep, and/or their offspring, provided within a land/lease/board agreement attested to by both parties of the agreement. A land/lease/ board agreement must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the January club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 2/1.
5. If the land/lease/borrow agreement is not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any and all animals covered by the agreement. A land/lease/board agreement will cover the ewe and any offspring from her, therefore any offspring from a lease/loaned ewe is eligible to be shown in the appropriate breed classes. Offspring covered by land/lease/board agreements or born on the member's property must be born before 5/1.
6. If a market lamb project is not being raised on the member's property (or that of an immediate family member's), the animal must be listed on the member's land/lease/board agreement.
7. A market lamb must be judged a blue ribbon (Excellent) to qualify for the sale in addition to having met the 75-pound requirement.
8. First & Second Place animals from each weight class will make up the championship class. An individual 4-H member may show more than one animal in the championship class.
9. The champion & reserve champion animals in the market lamb show must be sold. All other animals that receive a blue ribbon and qualify for the sale may be sold at the 4-H's discretion. Only one 4-H market lamb project can be sold in the Market Animal Sale, although a member can raise and show more than one project animal. A maximum of two lambs may be brought and shown, due to limited barn space at the fair. If a 4-H member receives both Grand & Reserve Champion market lamb titles, both lambs must be sold by the 4-H member.
10. All wethers must be castrated with a knife or elastrator 60 days prior to show. If a wether was entered into the Market Lamb class and the 4-H member opted not to sell it, the member may enter the animal into the wether class. Members must list all sheep that may be eligible to compete. Only two entries per member will be eligible to compete.
11. Market lambs may not be shown at halter.
12. Market lambs must be ready to be weighed in at 8:00 a.m. on Monday of the fair. Therefore 4-H members must arrive by 7:00 a.m., to clean pens and feed their animals. Failure to do so will forfeit the right to show.
13. Market lambs must be shorn within 30 days of the show and/or fleece may not be longer than 1/2 inch.

4-H SHEEP & MARKET LAMB PROJECT (continued)

14. All Market lambs that a 4-H member is considering bringing to the fair, must be registered on the entry forms. All animals will be on one yellow registration form, including photos and tag or tattoo identification numbers.
15. Members will have until 1/1 to set up a land/lease/borrow agreement with a farmer. Members must submit a land/lease/borrow agreement to the club leader at the January meeting. If the loaner agreement is not turned in to the 4-H office by the 2/1 deadline, the member forfeits the eligibility to show any and all animals covered by the land/lease/borrow agreement.

SECTION: MAR -MARKET LAMB

Classes will be adjusted into 3 or 4 classes at the discretion of the leader and/or judge depending on number of animals at weigh-in. Market Lamb—all entries enter into **Class A**.

4-H DAIRY GOAT PROJECT

The following policy to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H goat project shows at the NJSF®/SCFHS.

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each member is responsible for obtaining a NJSF/SCFHS livestock entry form as soon as they are available from the 4-H office, web- site (www.sussex4h.org), or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member livestock entry forms must be submitted to the club leader for review and signing on or before the June club meeting. Any animals not listed on the entry forms will not be permitted on the fairgrounds. All entries listed on the entry forms must be included in the 4-H member's record book.
3. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the month of May and submitted to the club leader for review and signing on or before the June club meeting.
4. All entry forms and record books are to be reviewed, deemed complete, and signed by the club leader. The club leader should not sign the members' livestock entry forms unless their current project record book is submitted and deemed complete through May. The club leader is expected to collect each club member's entry forms and record book. Then the club leader, or an adult designated by the club leader must submit all the entry forms and record books from their club members to the 4-H office no later than July 1st. Individual members may not submit their paperwork directly to the 4-H office.
5. Department Chairperson reserves the right to restrict the number of entries per club/and or member based on the availability of barn space. Club leaders may restrict the number of entries of their own club members based on the barn space allocated to their club.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. An Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is required for each 4-H goat project entered. A CVI is required for all out of state animals. The AHC/CVI must be shown at Vet Check before entering the fairgrounds. An AHC/ CVI must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair.
2. In addition to the AHC/CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the fair. During the 4-H project year if the 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could prevent an animal's participation in the show, the 4-H club leader should provide guidance and/or educational activities that will help the 4-H member correct these health conditions.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds.
4. No horned animals will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit.
5. All goats must be a minimum of two months of age to enter the fairgrounds.
6. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of the The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, <http://njstatefair.org/>.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. 4-H members must have completed the 4th grade and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums.
2. A 4-H Cloverbud member can participate only in Cloverbud showmanship, costume, aged wether/education and fitting classes if the project leadership offers such a class. Cloverbud members must have completed the 1st-3rd grade. No cash premiums are awarded, only participation ribbons and trophies.

DAIRY GOAT PROJECT (Continued)

3. Please note that the purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to introduce Cloverbud members to a variety of 4-H projects, which are available to them upon reaching 4th grade. Participation in the 4-H Cloverbud program is not an opportunity to gain experience that can be credited towards a 4-H'er's participation in the standard 4-H program upon reaching the 4th grade.
4. All Junior/Senior members must have given at least a Club Level 4-H presentation to be eligible to show and/or receive premiums.
5. A member must have joined the project club before January 1st of the current year in order to show and receive premiums. Members who join after January 1st may show in the 4-H breed, showmanship, aged wether/education, costume and fitting classes as a learning experience and receive ribbons but not premiums.
6. The dress code for showing is clean white pants or shorts, a white collared show shirt, socks, and sturdy, safe shoes (no open toed shoes).
7. All members, meat and dairy, are to remain in the show barn for the duration of the goat show to assist as directed. Any members not in compliance will forfeit their premiums.

SECTION D: 4-H Dairy Goat Project Requirements

1. 4-H dairy goat breeding projects must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 2/1. An exception to this are goats, and/or their offspring, provided within land/lease and purchase agreements attested to by both parties. . The agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the January club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader before 2/1.
2. If the land/lease and purchase agreements are not turned in to the Club Leader by the 2/1 deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any/all animals covered by those agreements in the breed classes. Any animals purchased or provided by agreements after 2/1, but before 5/1, will not be eligible to be shown in breed classes at this year's fair. They may be shown in the showmanship, fitting, aged wether/education and/or costume classes.
3. The 2/1 land/lease and purchase agreements will cover the doe and any offspring from her, therefore any offspring from a lease/loaned doe is eligible to be shown in the appropriate breed classes. Offspring covered by land/lease and purchase agreements, and purchased, must be on the member's property before 5/1.
4. The 2/1 deadline does not apply to animals that may be used by a Cloverbud member. All animals to be used by a Cloverbud member that will be leased, loaned, owned or born on their property are subject to the 5/1 deadline. They must own or submit a land/lease agreement to the club leader by the April club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the club leader before 5/1.
5. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a project animal from within a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain land/lease and purchase agreements by 2/1 for any potential mothers and/or offspring that they may be buying. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure that they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring purchased from those leased mothers would be covered by the land/lease and purchase agreements and must be on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers aren't listed, a farm name/premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers or tattoos must match farm premise ID#s submitted on the land/lease and purchase agreements.
6. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a project animal from beyond a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain a purchase agreement by 2/1 for any potential mothers and/or offspring that they may be buying. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring purchased from those listed mothers would be covered by the purchase agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers aren't listed, a farm name/premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers or tattoos must match farm premise ID#s submitted on the land/lease and purchase agreements. Because it's too far to travel to that farmer/breeder to fulfill the requirements of a land/lease agreement, they must obtain a land/lease agreement by 2/1 with a local farmer of their choice and meet all of the requirements of said agreement. They do

not need to bring the locally leased animal to the fair or show it, but it must be listed in their project book. It is strictly to gain hands-on experience working with a breeding project since it would be impossible to do this with the mother of the out-of-area offspring.

7. For those, who already own breeding projects, and are looking to add new breeding projects to their herd, they will need to obtain a purchase agreement from the farmer/breeder for any potential breeding project, mother and/or offspring. Any offspring born on that farm would be covered by the purchase agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1.
8. 4-H members who participated in a land/lease program with a farmer this year (2023-24) will be required to renew their agreement or establish one with another farmer before 10/1/24. Land/lease agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the September club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 10/1/24.
 - a. First year club members will have until 1/1/24 to set up a land/lease agreement with a farmer. First year members must submit a land/lease/borrow agreement to their Club Leader on or before the December Club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 1/1/24. If the land/lease is not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any/all animals covered by the land/lease agreement in the breed classes. They may be shown in the showmanship, fitting, aged wether/education and/or costume classes.
 - b. The 10/1 and 1/1 deadlines do not apply to animals that may be used by a Cloverbud member. All animals to be used by a Clover- bud member that will be leased, loaned, owned or born on their property are subject to the 5/1 deadline. They must own or submit a land/lease agreement to the club leader by the April club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the club leader before 5/1.
9. 4-H member is expected to fit all of their own showmanship and fitting class animals. Junior and new senior members in their first project year may receive assistance from other 4-H members and Club Leaders. No 4-H member may do the work of fitting a goat for another member. If a member needs assistance, they may request the help of another member or leader subject to the approval of their club leader. Parents are expected to support and enforce this rule with their own children. Any animal fitted by parents after it arrives on the fairgrounds will be disqualified from showing in a fitting or showmanship class. Hoof trimming is to be considered maintenance, not fitting, and will not be grounds for disqualification from any class should a member need assistance with it.
10. The base date for computing the animal's age is the day of the show.
11. This show is not sanctioned by ADGA and will be run according to the Sussex County 4-H goat project leadership guidelines for the following breeds: All other purebreds, Alpine, Toggenburg, Nubian, Nigerian Dwarf, Oberhasli, LaMancha, Saanen, and recorded grades, subject to change at the Department Chairpersons discretion.
12. The original registration certificate is required for all animals six months of age or older, and must be shown to the show secretary before the start of judging if requested, to participate in purebred classes. For animals under 6 months, the original registration certificate or a duplicate application stamped by ADGA will be accepted. No copies of the registration certificate or stamped applications, telegrams, or phone calls will be accepted as proof of ownership.
13. Any doe that has ever freshened or is in milk shall compete in the Senior Class. Any doe 24 months or under, that has never freshened, shall compete in the Junior Class. Any doe over 24 months that has never freshened may only be shown in a showmanship, fitting or aged wether/education or costume class.
14. Members may choose to bring their milking dairy does in for just the day of the show. They must be in place before the fair opens and leave the fairgrounds by the end of the day, after the fair closes, or as directed by the Ag President. Departure will be at the direction of the Ag President and supervised by Ag area employees and security if needed to ensure the public's safety during removal. These animals will be ineligible for premiums. Only animals that remain for the length of the fair are eligible for premiums. If member is not exhibiting any other goats for the duration of the fair, they will only receive a day pass for the day of the show. Members are encouraged to keep their milkers at the fair for its duration as exhibits and for educational milking demonstrations to the public.*(added 7/2/24)*

2. A Beginner class will be offered to Cloverbud or any members who have not cantered at any other show
3. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader.
4. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be up-to-date through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
5. An entry fee of \$20 for the day is to be paid when you pick up your number.
6. Sussex County 4-H Horse Club members must have an up to date project book in order to be eligible for premiums. Premiums are as follows: 1st-\$20, 2nd-\$18, 3rd-\$16, 4th-\$14, 5th-\$12, 6th-\$10, 7th-\$8 and 8th-\$6.
7. Classes will be conducted in accordance with the current NJ State 4-H Horse Show Rulebook (<http://nj4h.rutgers.edu/horses/horseshow/>).
8. A 4-H Horse Registration form must be completed and submitted to the 4-H Office prior to April 1st. This form is available in the 4-H Horse Project Record Book—page 33.
9. If the 4-H member is using a leased/borrowed horse, a 4-H horse project lease/borrow form must be completed and submitted to the 4-H office prior to April 1st along with the horses registration form. The lease/borrow form is located in the 4-H Horse Project Record book page—34.
10. All members must participate in a showmanship class.
11. A 4-H member must give a county-level presentation in order to show in the 4-H Show at the Fair.
12. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of the The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, www.njstatefair.org.

The following policy to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H swine project shows at the NJSF®/SCFHS.

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each 4-H member is responsible for obtaining an NJSF®/SCFHS 4-H livestock entry form as soon as they are available from the 4-H office or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader.
3. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H Office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
4. 4-H member entry forms turned in after July 1st will be identified as received late. 4-H animal projects that are entered late will forfeit all premiums, placings and the right to sell their animal at the Market Animal Sale.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) or an Animal Health Certificate (AHC) is required for each 4-H swine project entered. The CVI/AHC must be shown at vet check prior to entering the fairgrounds. A CVI/AHC must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair. A CVI is required for all out-of-state animals.
2. In addition to the CVI/AHC requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the fair. During the 4-H project year if the 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could prevent an animal's participation in the show, the 4-H club leader should provide guidance and/or educational activities that will help the 4-H member correct these health conditions.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds.
4. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of the The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, <http://www.njstatefair.org/>.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. 4-H members must have completed the 4th grade and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums or sell a market animal in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
2. A 4-H Cloverbud member can participate only in breeding and showmanship classes if the project leadership offers such a class. Cloverbud members must have completed the 1st–3rd grade. No cash premiums are awarded, only participation ribbons and trophies.
3. Please note that the purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to introduce Cloverbud members to a variety of 4-H projects, which are available to them upon reaching 4th grade. Participation in the 4-H Cloverbud program is not an opportunity to gain experience that can be credited towards a 4-H'ers participation in the regular 4-H program upon reaching the 4th grade.
4. All 4-H members who intend to sell a market hog in the 4-H Market Animal Sale must have given a county-level 4-H public presentation during the project year.

4-H SWINE PROJECT (Continued)

5. A person must have joined the project club before January 1st of current year in order to show. Members who miss the January 1st deadline may show in the 4-H breeding show as a learning experience and receive ribbons, but will not be awarded cash premiums and will be unable to sell a market animal at the 4-H Market Animal Sale.
6. All club members are required to raise and show at least one breeding swine project in order to sell a market hog.
7. The dress code for showing is clean jeans; a white collared shirt (no t-shirts); socks, and sturdy, safe shoes (no open-toed shoes).

SECTION D: 4-H Breeding Project Requirements

1. 4-H swine projects must have been owned and present at the home of the 4-H member or the immediate family by May 1st. An exception to this would be swine falling under the loaner agreement attested to by both parties of the agreement. A loaner agreement must be on file at the 4-H office by May 1st.
2. The right to cancel classes or change classes is reserved by the chairperson.
3. Exhibitors will be expected to provide their own feeding utensils & equipment, and be responsible for feeding and watering their own animals.
4. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed and to accept conditions as provided without controversy. Animals must be kept in show shape.
5. Animals must be on the grounds before 5:00 pm of the first Friday of the fair and remain until the end of the fair.

SECTION E: Market Hog Project Requirements

1. Market hogs must be born February 1st or later of the current year.
2. Market hogs must be owned and present at the home of the member by May 1st of current year.
3. Market projects must weigh between 200 lbs and 275 lbs when weighed in at the fair in order to qualify for the Market Animal Sale.
4. A market hog must be judged a blue ribbon (Excellent) to qualify for the sale.
5. First & Second place animals from each weight class will make up the championship class. An individual 4-H member may show more than one animal in the championship class.
6. The champion & reserve champion animals in the market show must be sold. All other animals that receive a *blue* ribbon and qualify for the sale may be sold at the 4-H's discretion. Only one 4-H market hog project may be sold in the Market Animal Sale, although a member can raise and show more than one project animal. *The only exception to this is when the member is awarded both grand and reserve champions.*
7. Market animals must be ready to be weighed in by 8:00 am and will be weighed no later than 10:00 am on Monday of the fair at times to be announced by the division chairpersons. Failure to do so will forfeit the right to show.

4-H MEAT GOAT & MARKET KID PROJECT

The following policy to govern 4-H member participation in the Sussex County 4-H goat project shows at the NJSF®/SCFHS.

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each member is responsible for obtaining a NJSF/SCFHS livestock entry form as soon as they are available from the 4-H office, website (www.sussex4h.org), or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member livestock entry forms must be submitted to the club leader for review and signing on or before the June club meeting. Any animals not listed on the entry forms will not be permitted on the fairgrounds. All entries listed on the entry forms must be included in the 4-H member's record book. Exceptions may be made by Market Animal Sale (MAS) committee for approved replacements.
3. Each project animal must be recorded in the 4-H member's record book. The record book must be completed through the Month of May and submitted to the club leader for review and signing on or before the June club meeting.
4. All entry forms and record books are to be reviewed, deemed complete, and signed by the club leader. The club leader should not sign the members' livestock entry forms unless their current project record book is submitted and deemed complete through May. The club leader is expected to collect each club member's entry forms and record book. Then the club leader, or an adult designated by the club leader must submit all the entry forms and record books from their club members to the 4-H office no later than July 1st. Individual members may not submit their paperwork directly to the 4-H office.
5. Department Chairperson reserves the right to restrict the number of entries per club and/or member based on the availability of barn space. Club leaders may restrict the number of entries of their own club members based on the barn space allocated to their club.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) or Animal Health Certificate (AHC) is required for each 4-H goat project entered. A CVI MUST be used for all out-of-state goats. The AHC form may be used for in-state goats and is available on the fair website. Both forms require a veterinarian signature and inspection of the animals at their farm prior to the fair. The CVI or AHC must be shown to the veterinarian at vet-check before entering the fairgrounds. The CVI or AHC must be shown to the club leader before unloading animals at the fair. The CVI or AHC must be kept in the barn while the animal is at the fair.
2. In addition to the AHC/CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's animal's participation in the show; they should inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the fair. During the 4-H project year if the 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could prevent an animal's participation in the show, the 4-H club leader should provide guidance and/or educational activities that will help the 4-H member correct these health conditions.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project animal is in question at the fair, a veterinarian will examine the animal and determine if the project animal should be removed from the fairgrounds.
4. No horned animals will be allowed in a 4-H show, barn and/or exhibit. Scurs not to exceed 2" from hair line.
5. All goats must be a minimum of two months of age to enter the fairgrounds.
6. All exhibitors must abide by the Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor & General Health Information section of The New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm & Horse Show website, <http://www.njstatefair.org/>

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. 4-H members must have completed the 4th grade and have met all members in good standing requirements to be eligible to show and receive premiums. All members must participate in their project showmanship class to receive premiums or sell a market goat in the 4-H Market Animal Sale.

4-H MEAT GOAT & Market Kid Project (Continued)

2. A 4-H Cloverbud member can participate only in Cloverbud showmanship, costume, and fitting classes if the project leadership offers such a class. Cloverbud members must have completed the K – 3rd grade. No cash premiums are awarded, only participation ribbons and trophies.
3. Please note that the purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to introduce Cloverbud members to a variety of 4-H projects, which are available to them upon reaching 4th grade. Participation in the 4-H Cloverbud program is not an opportunity to gain experience that can be credited towards a 4-H'er's participation in the standard 4-H program upon reaching the 4th grade.
4. All Junior/Senior members must have given at minimum a Club Level 4-H presentation to be eligible to show and/or receive premiums. All 4-H members who intend to sell a market kid in the Market Animal Sale must have given a county level 4-H public presentation.
5. A member must have joined the project club before January 1st of the current year in order to show in the Meat Goat Show and be eligible for premiums. Members who join later than January 1st may show in the 4-H showmanship, breed, costume, fitting and aged wether/education classes as a learning experience and receive ribbons but not premiums and will be unable to sell at the Market Animal Sale.
6. The dress code for showing is clean blue jeans or shorts, a white collared show shirt, socks, and sturdy, safe shoes (no open toed shoes).
7. All members, meat and dairy, are to remain in the show barn for the duration of the goat show to assist as directed. Any members not in compliance will forfeit their premiums.
8. All members wishing to sell a market goat must have been enrolled and successfully completed the previous program year in its entirety through the end of the fair as a 4-H member in good standing to become eligible to sell a market goat.

SECTION D: 4-H Meat Breed Goat Project Requirements

1. 4-H meat goat breed projects must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 2/1. An exception to this is goats, and/ or their offspring, provided within land/lease/borrow and purchase agreements attested to by both parties of the agreement. The agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the January club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 2/1.
2. If the land/lease and purchase agreements are not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any and all animals covered by those agreements in the breed classes or Market Kid Show. Any animals purchased or provided by agreements after 2/1, but before 5/1, will not be eligible to be shown in breed classes or Market Kid Show at this year's Fair. They may be shown in the showmanship, fitting, costume and/or aged wether/education classes.
3. The 2/1 land/lease and purchase agreements will cover the doe and any offspring from her, therefore any offspring from a lease/ loaned doe is eligible to be shown in the appropriate breed classes. Offspring covered by lease/loan and purchase agreements and purchased must be on the member's property before 5/1.
4. The 2/1 deadline does not apply to animals that may be used by a Cloverbud member. All animals to be used by a Cloverbud member that will be leased, loaned, owned or born on their property are subject to the 5/1 deadline. They must own or submit a land/lease agreement to the club leader by the April club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the club leader before 5/1.
5. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a project animal from within a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain land/lease and purchase agreements by 2/1 for any potential mothers and/or offspring that they may be buying. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure that they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring purchased from those leased mothers would be covered by the land/lease and purchase agreements and must be on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers aren't listed, a farm name/premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers or tattoos must match farm premise ID#s submitted on the land/lease purchase agreements.

4-H MEAT GOAT & Market Kid Project (Continued)

6. If a member, who doesn't already own a breeding project, wishes to purchase a project animal from beyond a 35-mile radius of their property, they will need to obtain a purchase agreement by 2/1 for any potential mothers and/or offspring that they may be buying. Listing multiple mothers would be recommended to ensure they would be able to choose an animal to their liking. Any offspring purchased from those listed mothers would be covered by the purchase agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1. If specific mothers aren't listed, a farm name/premise ID# would cover all potential offspring born on that farm. Offspring tag numbers or tattoos must match farm premise ID#s submitted on the land lease and purchase agreements. Because it's too far to travel to that farmer/ breeder to fulfill the requirements of a land/lease agreement, they must obtain a land/lease agreement by 2/1 with a local farmer of their choice and meet all of the requirements of said agreement. They do not need to bring the locally leased animal to the fair or show it, but it must be listed in their project book. It is strictly to gain hands-on experience working with a breeding project since it would be impossible to do this with the mom For those, who already own breeding projects, and are looking to add new breeding projects to their herd, they will need to obtain a purchase agreement from the farmer/breeder for any potential breeding project, mother and/or offspring. Any offspring born on that farm would be covered by the purchase agreement and must be on the members property by 5/1.
7. Returning 4-H members who participated in a land/lease/board program with a farmer this year (2023-24) will be required to renew their agreement or establish one with another farmer before 10/1/24. Land/lease/board agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the September club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 10/1/24.
8. First year club members will have until 1/1/25 to set up a land/lease agreement with a farmer. First year members must submit a land/lease agreement to their Club Leader on or before the December Club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 1/1/25. If the land/lease/board is not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any/all animals covered by the land/lease/board agreement in the breed classes. They may be shown in the showmanship, fitting, aged wether/education and/or costume classes.
9. The 10/1 and 1/1 deadlines do not apply to animals that may be used by a Cloverbud member. All animals to be used by a Cloverbud member that will be leased, loaned, owned or born on their property are subject to the 5/1 deadline. They must own or submit a land/lease agreement to the club leader by the April club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the club leader before 5/1.
10. 4-H member is expected to fit all of their own showmanship and fitting class animals. Junior and new senior members in their first project year may receive assistance from other 4-H members and Club Leaders. No 4-H member may do the work of fitting a goat for another member. If a member needs assistance, they may request the help of another member or leader subject to the approval of their Club Leader. Parents are expected to support and enforce this rule with their own children. Any animal fitted by parents after it arrives on the fairgrounds will be disqualified from showing in a fitting or showmanship class. Hoof trimming is to be considered maintenance, not fitting and will not be grounds for disqualification from any class should a member need assistance with it.
11. The base date for computing the animal's age is the day of the show.
12. This show is not sanctioned by ABGA and will be run according to the Sussex County 4-H goat project leadership guidelines for the following breeds: Boer, Kiko, Myotonic and Mixed Meat Breed, subject to change at the Department Chairperson's discretion.
13. Any doe over 24 months that has never freshened may only be shown in a showmanship, costume, fitting or aged wether/education class.
14. Meat goat breeds will not be disqualified for having extra teats.
15. First & Second place animals from each age class will make up the championship class.
16. Meat goat breeds must be shown by their owner, unless the owner is showing more than one animal. Those additional animals must be shown by any 4-H goat project member.

SECTION E: Market Kid Project Requirements

1. Market goats must be born January 1st or later of the current year.
2. 4-H Market Animal Sale goat project must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 5/1. If animal is not born on member's property, it must be on the member's property at the age of weaning, but *no more* than 10¹ weeks of age. Head with Scrapies ear tag and body shot photos of acquired animals must be provided to both the club leader and the Department Chairperson at the time of purchase and again on the day of delivery to your, or leased, property. Failure to provide pictures promptly, or submitted after the weaning age deadline has passed, is grounds for disqualification from showing and selling of the animal. Club Leader or Department Chairperson reserves the right to inspect your animals at your farm at an agreed upon time.
1. If a market goat project is not being boarded on the member's property (or that of an immediate family member's), the animal must be listed on the member's land/lease agreement.
2. Market projects must weigh between 50 lb and 125 lb when weighed in at the fair in order to qualify for the Market Animal Sale. If the animal does not make minimum weight, it can still be shown in the Aged Wether/Education class, but will not qualify for sale in the MAS.
3. Market projects must be shown by their owner, unless the owner is showing more than one animal. Those additional animals must be shown by any 4-H goat project member, subject to exception on a case-to-case basis approved by the Department Chairperson.
4. A market goat must be judged a blue ribbon (excellent) and meet all accepted market animal health requirements to qualify for the sale.
5. First & Second place animals from each weight class will make up the championship class. An individual 4-H member may show more than one animal in the championship class.
6. The Champion & Reserve Champion animals in the goat market show **MUST** be sold. All other animals that receive a blue ribbon and qualify for the sale may be sold at the 4-Her's discretion. Only one 4-H market goat project can be sold in the Market Animal Sale, although a member can raise and show more than one project animal.
7. The only exception to this is when the member is awarded both Grand and Reserve Champions.
8. A member can raise and enter up to three market kids in their livestock entry forms and project record book but can only show a maximum of two market kids. The third one may be used as a back-up animal should the 4-H member need to replace one of their project animals due to illness or death, as per MAS rules. If barn space is limited, member may only be allowed to bring a maximum of two market kids to the fair.
9. All bucks must be castrated. All market kids must be disbudded. Scurs not to exceed 2" from hair line.
10. Market animals must be ready to be weighed in by 8:00 am and will be weighed no later than 10:00 am on Monday of the fair at times to be announced by the division chairpersons. Failure to do so will forfeit the right to show.
11. All club members are required to raise and show at least one breeding goat project to be eligible to sell a market kid.
12. 4-H goat breeding projects must be owned and present at the home of the 4-H member by 2/1. An exception to this is goats, and/or their offspring, provided within land/lease, and purchase agreements attested to by both parties of the agreement. The agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the January club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 2/1.

13. If the land/lease agreement is not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any and all animals covered by the agreement. A land/lease/board agreement will cover the doe and any offspring from her, therefore any offspring from a lease/loaned doe is eligible to be shown in the appropriate breed classes. Offspring covered by land/lease agreement if purchased must be on the member's property before 5/1.
14. Offspring from a breeding project may be shown so long as they are recorded in the member's record book and are at least 2 months old.
15. 4-H members who participated in a land/lease program with a farmer this year (2023-24) will be required to renew their agreement or establish one with another farmer before 10/1. Land/lease agreements must be turned in to the Club Leader on or before the September club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 10/1.
16. First year club members will have until 1/1/25 to set up a land/lease agreement with a farmer. First year members must submit a land/lease agreement to their Club Leader on or before the December Club meeting and turned in to the 4-H office by the Club Leader by 1/1/25. If the land/lease/board agreement is not turned in to the Club Leader by the above deadline, member forfeits the eligibility to show any and all animals covered by the land/lease agreement.

SECTION A: Registration and Entry Form Requirements

1. Each 4-H member is responsible for obtaining an NJSF/SCF&HS 4-H livestock entry form as soon as they are available from the 4-H Office, online, or from the club leader.
2. Completed 4-H member entry forms must be reviewed and signed by the club leader and returned to the 4-H office by July 1st.
3. The 4-H member's record book must be completed through the month of May, reviewed and signed by the club leader in June and delivered to the 4-H Office with the 4-H member entry form by July 1st by the club leader or by an adult designated by the club leader.
4. Entry forms will not be accepted after July 1st and the 4-H member will not be allowed to participate in the show if the form or record book is received late.

SECTION B: Animal Health Requirements

1. An Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is required for each 4-H alpaca attending the fair, including companion alpacas. A CVI is required for all out of state animals. The AHC/CVI must be shown at Vet Check before entering the fairgrounds. The AHC/CVI must be kept in the barn while the alpaca(s) is/are at the fair.
2. In addition to the AHC/CVI requirements, if a 4-H club leader becomes aware of health conditions that could affect a 4-H member's alpaca's participation in the show; they will inform the fair livestock supervisor and/or veterinarian at the Fair.
3. When the health of a 4-H member's project alpaca is in question a veterinarian will examine the alpaca and determine if the project alpaca should be removed from the fairgrounds.
4. Every alpaca must also have proof of a negative BVD-PCR, anytime in the lifetime of the alpaca and proof of a current rabies vaccine, within the last 12 months. Both must be properly stated on the AHC/CVI.

SECTION C: 4-H Member Requirements

1. All exhibitors must be active 4-H members from a Sussex County 4-H alpaca club and must be members in good standing to be eligible to show. All members must be members of a Sussex county 4-H alpaca club to receive premiums.
2. Members must be registered members by January 1st, have attended at least two-thirds of the 4-H club meetings and have done a county level Public Presentation to be eligible to show.
3. Record books must be up to date as of the first meeting in June and submitted to the 4-H leader with the properly completed 4-H member entry form at the first meeting in June.
4. Exhibitors shall be neatly dressed when exhibiting and wear black or dark colored pants or shorts, clean white shirts (names and logos prohibited, unless shirts are provided by a sponsor) and wear sturdy, safe shoes (no open-toed, open heel, or heeled shoes).

ALPACA PROJECTS (Continued)

SECTION D: 4-H Alpaca Requirements

1. All alpacas must be at least six months of age as of the show date to show.
2. Project alpacas may be owned by the exhibitor or exhibitor's family or leased from an alpaca farm with the lease agreement on file at the 4-H office. Project alpaca substitutions due to loss, illness, or injury will only be allowed at the discretion of the club leader.
3. Alpacas may be either breed type, huacaya or suri and be either male or female, breeder or non-breeder.
4. Alpacas must have been shorn using full body shearing the spring prior to the show to be shown at the fair.
5. Alpacas are to be shown in a proper fitting halter with a lead line in a non distracting color, black being the preferred color.
6. All exhibitors must have their project alpaca at the fairgrounds on the day designated for the alpacas to arrive and may not remove their alpaca until the closing of the fair if barn space is available.

Awards

1st thru 6th place ribbons will be awarded for each class with Champion and Reserve being awarded for highest combined scores in classes one thru three (five exhibitors need to be in each class for the champion and reserve to be awarded). Participation ribbons will be awarded to all Cloverbud and non-placing entries.

If space is available all 4-H animals must remain until the end of the Fair or forfeit the premiums paid by the New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm And Horse Show.

All exhibitors must abide by the rules of the Agricultural Division of the NJSF/SCF&HS, in addition to Health Requirements in the Livestock Exhibitor and General Health Information section of the New Jersey State Fair®/Sussex County Farm and Horse Show website, <http://www.njstatefair.org/>

Round Robin Championship Show

Department Chair: 4-H Staff

The Round Robin event, held on Thursday night, features showmanship champions from various 4-H animal shows held during the fair. It is designed to test the skills of showmanship champions by requiring them to show all animal species.

The following 4-H divisions participate: Beef, Dairy, Horse, Swine, Goat, Alpaca, Rabbit/Cavy/Small Animal, Poultry, and Sheep

The goal of the Round Robin is for the top showmen in each of the divisions listed above to compete for top overall showman awards in a fun and safe manner. Members will learn to work with other 4-H members, and gain showmanship skills for the other species. Round Robin information packets will be available at the 4-H Information Table (Shotwell Building) for interested members. Additionally, club representatives should be available to answer questions and demonstrate showmanship in their barn from 5:30-7:30 pm on Thursday.

Leaders from each project area are responsible for:

- Informing the 4-H showmanship winner about the Round Robin contest
- Informing the county 4-H office of the junior and senior showmanship winner for their species' show.
- Providing suitable species (complacent, people friendly) for their Round Robin station.
- Providing judges (or contacts for judges) for their species' Round Robin station

Rules

1. Participants are the 4-H members recognized as the best Junior and Senior Showmen in their species show during the current fair. (Top showmen from the prior year will represent any species whose show occurs after the Round Robin.)
2. Junior participants are members in grades 4-8 as of September prior to the current fair. Senior participants are members in grades 9-13 as of September prior to the current fair.
3. In the event a member participating in more than one species show receives best showmen for more than one species/division, a Department Chair will discuss with the member which species they will represent in the Round Robin.
4. The first-place individual in the Junior and Senior Showmanship classes for that division must be the person to represent that division unless:
5. They qualified in more than one division and they will represent another division, as stated in rule number 3.
OR
6. They wish to forfeit participation this year to allow another member the opportunity to compete. In these cases, the Department Chair will pass the honor to the second-place person. The third place then fourth place person may only be used if the division chair deems that person to be qualified to compete.
7. If a member's club leader and 4-H Staff determine that a member cannot safely show each of the animals the member will not be able to show in the Round Robin. The next eligible member will represent that Division in the Round Robin grade category.
8. All showmen are expected to wear clean, neat jeans (No rips or tears), club or show shirts, boots (No Uggs®, rain boots, flip flops, Crocs®, sneakers, etc). Safety is the primary concern. Club leaders should be responsible for ensuring proper footwear and attire is worn before participants enter the ring.
9. All participants must follow the directions of the Round Robin Chairperson or designee once they have entered the ring.
10. Each participant will be judged on his/her showmanship skills with each of the different animals brought into the ring for his/her grade category. Participants will receive a score from each station; those scores will be totaled to determine the Junior and Senior Round Robin Champion. Showmen will exhibit all the animals, including their own species.

Awards

A Grand Champion Showman for Junior and Senior divisions will be awarded based on score and will be recognized as the overall top showmen in 4-H. They will also receive a \$50 prize.

Agricultural Representatives

Each year, a 4-H member may serve as the representative for a 4-H animal/livestock project exhibited at the Fair. These are collectively known as Ag Representatives.

Serving as the representative involves some responsibilities during the fair. Ag Reps should be knowledgeable, able to answer questions about their project and share information about 4-H and agriculture with fairgoers. During the fair, they will be required to attend certain events (see application for details).

Eligibility

1. The following 4-H project areas are eligible Agricultural Representatives: Beef, Dairy, Goat, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Horse, Alpaca, Rabbits/Cavies/Small Animals
2. 4-H members in grades 9-13 are eligible to apply to represent their 4-H species at the fair.
3. A generic application is available online, or a hard copy may be requested from the 4-H Office. Application packets must be returned to club leaders and to the 4-H Office by 6/19 (for 2023).
4. For project areas where there is more than one 4-H club, or there is more than one application, the 4-H Office will review the applications, secure judges and arrange an interview process as needed.
5. If a project area has only one club, and only one member applies, there will be no competition.
6. In the event no application is received for a project area, there will be no representative. (A junior representative may be nominated at the discretion of the department chairperson.)

2024: The 4-H Advisory Council has agreed to underwrite the costs for the representative's regalia. All regalia will be ordered by the Agricultural Representative Coordinator.
